An outstanding contribution was made by Daniel Goetz, winner of the Mark K. Inman Senior Essay Prize, awarded annually to the author of the best thesis submission for Economics 4400E.

Beginning with Emanuel Marcu and Chris Li's predictive analysis of strategic partnership games, the *Review* showcases the technical proficiency of students in Western's Undergraduate Economics program. Inspired by a special topic course offered during the 2009-2010 school year, Daniel Goetz's paper proposes an elegant model of wage determination in relation to criminal behavior. Jason Amaro and Zijin Gong make use of the linear probability model to decipher the effect of economic performance on average retirement dates across a sample of industries. This year's *Review* concludes with the Senior Essay Prize winning paper, in which Daniel Goetz shows the effect of government bailouts on the bankruptcy decisions of large firms.
