Course Objectives:

This course introduces the principles of microeconomics to first-year undergraduate students. It explains microeconomic tools relevant to pricing and purchasing decisions in different markets and how government interventions influence these decisions.

Course Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Use the production possibility theory to explain scarcity, choice, opportunity costs, and growth
- Use the supply and demand models to explain how the markets determine the prices and quantities of different goods.
- Understand the elasticity of demand and supply and their impact on firms' revenue and consumer expenditure.
- Explain consumer behaviour using their budget constraints and indifference curves.
- Describe producers' costs and profit maximization decisions in different markets.
- Explain the impact of government interventions on consumers' and producers' welfare.

All dates and times are tentative as they must be approved by Exam Central. When Exam Central confirms the date and time for the exams, I will notify you. The Registrar's Office will set the date and time for the final exam. **All times are ET.** Note that the assessment dates, times, and methods may change if classes move online.

Exam Format:

Midterms and the final exam are MCQs, in-person, closed-book exams.

Quizzes will require answering short-answer questions, including showing calculations and drawing graphs.

Exam Duration:

The duration of each midterm exam is 90 minutes. The duration of the final exam is 120 minutes. The duration of each quiz is 15 minutes.

Exam Locations:

Exam locations for the midterms and final exam will be announced at least seven days in advance.

Quizzes will be held during tutorials in the designated rooms. Students must attend their assigned tutorial groups for the quizzes. If a student does not attend their assigned tutorial or attends a tutorial from another section, they will receive a zero for that quiz. To ensure consistency and fairness, this policy will be strictly enforced with no exceptions. However, only the best two out of three quizzes will be counted towards the final grade.

During exams, you may have pens, pencils, a ruler, erasers, your student card, and **a non-graphing, non-programmable calculator** out of its case at your desk. All other items, including watches and cell phones, must be left in your bag at the front of the examination room.

Students should keep this schedule and workload in mind, given their other courses. Students should notify the instructor of conflicts with any of these test dates before 28-Sep.

Policy Regarding Missed Exams:

Midterm Exams

- There will be no make-up exams for missed midterm exams.
- Students are allowed to miss one midterm exam using self-attestation and notification to the instructor within 24 hours. If a student misses both midterm exams, they must obtain approval from Academic Counselling for the other missed exam and must notify the instructor within 24 hours. If a student misses both midterms without using self-attestation and without approval from Academic Counseling, they will receive a grade of zero for both exams.
- The weight of any approved missed midterm exam or exam using self-attestation will be transferred to the final exam.

Quizzes

- There will be no make-up exams for missed quizzes. As there is a flexible grading policy for the quizzes, self-attestation will not be accepted.
- The best 2 out of 3 quizzes will be counted towards the final grade, with each quiz contributing 5 points. No academic consideration or medical documentation is required for missing one quiz, and students do not need to notify the professor if they miss one quiz.
- If a student attends all quizzes, the best two scores will be used for grading.
- If a student misses two quizzes, they must receive approval from Academic Counseling for one of the quizzes. Without approval, the student will receive a grade of zero. With approval from Academic Counseling, 5% from the second missed quiz will be transferred to the final exam.
- If a student misses all quizzes, with approval from Academic Counseling, the entire 10% weight allocated for quizzes will be transferred to the final exam.

Reallocation of Missed Exam Weight to the Final Exam

• If a missed exam's weight is reallocated to the final exam, the student will take the regular final exam with the rest of the class. However, the weight of the final exam will be higher for students with such reallocations.

Note:

It is strongly recommended that students attend all exams. Doing so helps in understanding the concepts better, staying regular, and performing well. The final exam is cumulative and therefore more challenging than the midterms and quizzes. Even if a student's performance is not satisfactory in a midterm or quiz, attending the exam can help them identify weaknesses and areas needing more focus.

Final Exam

The final exam will cover materials from the entire term. Students who miss the final exam must take their documentation to Academic Counselling and notify the instructor within 24 hours. Once Academic Counselling approves your documentation for the missed Final exam, there will be a makeup date set by the instructor.

Students who miss any assessment must follow Western University's procedures to approve their absence to receive accommodation. If a student does not receive approval from the Academic Counselling for the Final exam, the instructor will assign a grade of zero for that exam.

Policy Regarding Makeup Tests and Final Examinations

Faculty of Social Science policy states that oversleeping or misreading an exam schedule is NOT grounds for a makeup. This rule applies to midterm and final exams in the Department of Economics.

Policies Regarding Academic Accommodation

- Academic accommodation will not be granted automatically on request. Students must demonstrate by documentation that there are compelling medical or compassionate grounds before academic accommodation will be considered. The Faculty of Social Science's policies on academic accommodation are found at <u>https://counselling.ssc.uwo.ca/procedures/academic consideration.html</u>
- Accommodation for Students with Disabilities: Students with disabilities or accessibility challenges should work with Accessible Education (formerly SSD, see <u>http://academicsupport.uwo.ca/accessible education/index.html</u>), which provides recommendations for accommodation based on medical documentation or psychological and cognitive testing. The accommodation policy can be found here: <u>Academic Accommodation for Students with Disabilities</u>.
- **Rewriting Exams and Retroactive Reweighting are NOT Permitted:** Students who proceed to write a test or examination must be prepared to accept the mark. Rewriting tests or examinations, or retroactive reweighting of marks, is **not** permitted. Students must also book travel arrangements AFTER final exam dates have been posted as they must not conflict with test or final exams.
- Unless medically incapable of doing so, students must notify their instructor prior to the test date or at least within 48 hours when requesting a makeup exam. Failure to follow this procedure may result in denial of academic accommodation and a grade of zero. Students should also set up an appointment as soon as possible to meet with their instructor. If the instructor is not available, send an email message to the instructor, copying the Undergraduate Coordinator at econugrd@uwo.ca. Notifying instructors of a missed exam does not automatically entitle students to a makeup.
- For medical illnesses, students may consult Student Health Services and request a Student Medical Certificate from the physician. If assessed by an off-campus doctor,

- **Documentation for Accommodation:** Individual instructors are not permitted to receive documentation directly from a student, whether in support of an application for consideration on medical grounds or for other reasons.

Policy Regarding Class Attendance and Engagement: If the instructor deems a student's attendance or engagement in the class to be unsatisfactory, that student may be prohibited from writing the final examination. Examples of unsatisfactory class engagement include frequent absences from an in-person or synchronous online class, lack of assignment submissions, and inadequate use of online course materials. Instructors who intend to make use of this policy will notify the student in advance.
