Registration

You are responsible for ensuring you are registered in the correct courses. Prerequisite Note

The formal prerequisite for this course is **Economics 2261A/B**. In addition, you should be very comfortable with **calculus**, **algebra**, **and geometry**. This course will make heavy use of all these tools.

You are responsible for ensuring that you have successfully completed all course prerequisites, and that you have not taken an anti-requisite course. Lack of pre-requisites may not be used as a basis for appeal. If you are found to be ineligible for a course, you may be removed from it at any time and you will receive no adjustment to your fees. This decision cannot be appealed.

If you find that you do not have the course prerequisites, it is in your best interest to drop the course well before the end of the add/drop period. Your prompt attention to this matter will not only help protect your academic record, but will ensure that spaces become available for students who require the course in question for graduation.

Course Description

This course is an advanced introduction to the study of international trade. We will examine models of international trade and investigate how well these models do in explaining the observed patterns of trade among countries. We will use the frameworks provided by these models to ask how large are the gains from trade, and to analyze policy issues such as tariffs and trade agreements. We will also examine theories of foreign investment and multinational firms.

Course Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will learn to:

- Identify major features of the bilateral patterns and industry composition of
- international trade flows in the data;
- Analyze the determinants of comparative advantage and international trade in common theories of international trade;
- Solve for equilibrium outcomes in simple, fully-specified models of international trade;
- Evaluate the effects of international trade on national output, wages, and productivity;
- Assess the predictions of international trade theories and compare them to data

Textbook

There is no required text for this course. You are responsible for all material covered in lectures, as well as articles and other readings that are made available on the course website. Please note that the material online will not cover everything that we will discuss in class, so it is important that you maintain a full set of notes on in-class material.

The following book is not a substitute for in-class notes, but may provide some background helpful in understanding the material. It is available on reserve in Weldon library.

Krugman, Obstfeld, and Melitz, "International Economics: Theory and Policy" (*first half*) A basic undergraduate text that treats the models we discuss at a *much lower* level. Previous versions without the third author are available, and are similar.

Grading

Your grade in this course will be based upon 4 homework assignments, a midterm exam, and a final exam. They will contribute to your final grade as follows:

Homework Assignments: 30% Midterm Exam 30% Final Exam 40%

Homework Assignments will be posted online, and each one will be due one week after it is posted. Your assignment must be turned in to me by the end of class on the due date. Assignments may not be submitted by email or any other method. Late assignments will not be accepted. **Your highest 3 homework scores will count toward your grade.** I encourage you to discuss the problems and solutions with your classmates, but you must each write up your own individual assignments independently. Identical or essentially identical assignments will receive a grade of zero.

The **Midterm Exam** will be given on Monday, Feb 12, during class time. **The Final Exam** will be held at a time and location to be determined by the University Registrar. Both exams will be closed-book and closed-notes. The only electronic device you may use during exams is a non-graphing, non-programmable calculator.

The final exam is **cumulative**, meaning it will cover all material in the course. If you miss a midterm due to illness or other acceptable excuse, and if Academic Counseling recommends accommodation, the weight of your midterm exam will be added to your final exam. Lack of an acceptable justification for missing an exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam.

Policy Regarding Makeup Tests and Final Examinations

Academic accommodation will **not** be granted automatically on request. You **must** demonstrate by documentation that there are **compelling** medical or compassionate grounds before academic accommodation will be considered.

If you decide to write a test or an examination, you must be prepared to accept the mark you earn. Rewriting tests or examinations, or having the value of the test or examination reweighted on a retroactive basis, is **not** permitted. Book airline flights after you know the dates of your final examinations. Airline flights must not conflict with test or final exams.

If you are requesting a makeup test for a midterm or a final examination, unless medically incapable, notify your instructor by email or phone, preferably prior to the scheduled date of the test, but definitely within <u>24 hours</u> of the date of the test or exam. Failure to follow this procedure may result in denial of a request for academic accommodation or result in a grade of zero. Set up an appointment as soon as possible to meet personally with your instructor. If the instructor is not available, you may send an email message, copying the Undergraduate Coordinator at econugrd@uwo.ca (Social Science Room 4075). Notifying your instructor of a missed test or exam does not automatically entitle you to a makeup test.

Students who seek a makeup test or examination must provide medical or other relevant verification that their absence from a regularly scheduled test or examination is beyond their control. Documentation must support your reasons. Medical documentation should be given to the Academic Counselling Office of your *home* Faculty as soon as possible (preferably within 24 hours of the test) if you know you may not be able to write your final examination on the scheduled day and time. Failure to follow this procedure, or to provide supporting documentation, may result in denial of a request for academic accommodation or result in a grade of zero. If your documentation is not acceptable, you will be given a zero for the missed test.

For personal illness, if you consult Student Health Services regarding your illness or personal problem, you should request a Student Medical Certificate from the physician. If you were seen by an off-campus doctor, obtain a certificate from his/her office at the time of your visit. The off-campus medical certificate form must be used and can be found at: http://www.uwo.ca/univsec/pdf/academic policies/appeals/medicalform.pdf. Notes stating "For Medical Reasons" are not considered sufficient.

For any other circumstances, if you are not sure what documentation to provide, ask your Academic Counsellor. If your documentation is judged sufficient, the Academic Counsellor will issue a Recommendation for a Special Examination (a single form for midterms or a triple color form for final examinations). Once you have this form, contact your instructor as soon as possible to make arrangements. Even if approved from your home faculty Academic Counsellor, there is no guarantee that you will be allowed to write the makeup test and exam.

For final examinations, you need permission from your *home* Faculty Counsellor, your instructor, and the Department Undergraduate Director. Failure to follow this procedure may result in an examination grade of zero. You must ensure that the Special Examination form has been signed by the instructor and Department Undergraduate Director and that the form is returned to the Academic Counselling Office for approval without delay. Make-up final examinations, if permitted, will be written within one month of the end of the exam period.
