Course Objectives:

This course introduces the principles of microeconomics to the undergraduate students. The course explains the microeconomic tools which are relevant in making pricing and purchasing decisions in different markets and how the government interventions influence these decisions. The course is designed for undergraduate students so that after completing the course, they can understand and interpret economic events around them.

Course Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of the course, students are expected to be able to:

1. use the production possibility theory to explain scarcity, choice, opportunity costs, and growth.

2. use the supply and demand models to explain how the markets determine the prices and quantities of different goods.

3. understand the elasticity of demand and supply and their impact on the firm's revenue and consumer's expenditure.

4. explain consumer behavior using their budget constraints and indifference curves.

5. explain a producer's costs and profit maximization decision.

6. explain the impact of government interventions in different markets.

Topics Covered and Readings:

Class Format:

Combination of lecture, problem solving and discussion

Class format will allow individual and **group problem-solving**. During sessions, students will be encouraged to ask and answer questions. They will spend a considerable amount of class time to formulate and solve problems by themselves and in groups. This group works will help solve important problems. **Some problems discussed during the sessions will not be available at OWL**.

Attending the sessions are not compulsory. I will not take attendance. But taking notes during the sessions and solving the problems together will help prepare for the course. The sessions will cover key sections from the textbook. By attending the sessions, students will have a clear idea about important sections, topics, tools, and problems. Please remember that I will not be able to reply using email about queries such as which topics are important and which are not. But I will remind you several times about important topics and tools during the sessions. It is important to treat lectures, lecture notes, and the textbook as perfect complements instead of perfect substitutes to perform well in this course.

9. Faculty of Social Science policy states that oversleeping or misreading an exam schedule is NOT grounds for a makeup. This rule applies to midterm and final exams in the Department of Economics.

Policy on Tests, Final Exams and on Missed Academic Responsibilities

Students who proceed to write a test or examination must be prepared to accept the mark. Rewriting tests or examinations, or retroactive reweighting of marks, is **not** permitted. Students must book travel arrangements AFTER final exam dates have been posted; travel is not an acceptable excuse for absence from a final exam.

Students who are temporarily unable to meet academic requirements due to extenuating circumstances can follow Western University procedures to request academic consideration through the following routes:

a) Submit a Self-Reported Absence form if the conditions for submission are met (e.g., only for exams or assessments worth 30% or less of the course mark; not applicable to final exams; maximum 2 self-reported absences per academic year; see <u>link</u> for full list of conditions and info).

If the conditions for submission of a Self-Reported Absence form are not met, then:

- b) For <u>medical</u> absences, submit a Student Medical Certificate (SMC) signed by a licensed medical or mental health practitioner along with a request for academic consideration to Academic Counselling in the student's home Faculty (see <u>link</u> for full info); or
- c) For <u>non-medical</u> absences (e.g., religious or compassionate), submit appropriate documentation to Academic Counselling in the student's home Faculty (see <u>link</u> for full info).

It is strongly recommended that students notify their instructors as soon as possible. University policy is that students **must** communicate with their instructors no later than **<u>24 hours</u>** after the end of the period covered by either the self-reported absence or SMC, or immediately upon their return following a documented absence. Failure to follow University policy and procedures may result in denial of academic accommodation and a grade of zero. Students should also set up an appointment to meet with their instructor as soon as possible. If the instructor is not available, send an email message, copying the Undergraduate Coordinator at <u>econugrd@uwo.ca</u>.

Note: Academic consideration is not normally intended for long-term, recurring absences, an existing disability, or high levels of stress related to academic performance.
