MINOR IN ECONOMICS

The Minor in Economics gives students in other fields of study an exposure to the core economic concepts and an understanding of real-world economic and policy issues. This module is a nice addition for those majoring or specializing in another discipline and signals a stronger background in economics. The Minor in Economics must be combined with another degree or as part of a Double Minor. Below is a suggested breakdown of coursework by year of study.

FIRST YEAR: 5.0

Students must complete first-year requirements.

Student must also complete Economics 1021A/B and Economics 1022A/B with no mark less than 60%. Students who fail to achieve at least 60% in either Economics 1021A/B and/or 1022A/B may take a Minor if they earn a grade of at least 60% in both Economics 2150A/B and 2152A/B in second year.

This module has no formal math admission requirements. However, students should note that Economics 2150A/B and 2152A/B require high school calculus or Mathematics 0110A/B for registration.
