# **Course Objectives:**

This course is an introduction to linear regression methods that are used in economics and econometrics. Linear regression is used throughout economics and business to understand relationships between events and observations, and to make forecasts to provide guidance. By the end of the course, students should be familiar with simple linear regression, inference, and major assumptions of the linear model. Students will also know how to test for violations of the assumptions and how to correct the model. The empirical assignments will give the students the opportunity to apply their knowledge to actual economic examples.

# **Course Learning Outcomes:**

- The students will reinforce their basic statistics, understand the intuition behind representing data with a line, and derive the simple linear regression estimators.
- Students will derive the simple linear model properties to show that it is unbiased, the variance of the estimator will be used to construct formal hypothesis tests of the parameters. The linear model assumptions are introduced which are key for the model properties and validate hypothesis tests.
- In economics, the theoretical model can be tested using an empirical design to determine relationships between variables. Multiple regression allows for more elaborate empirical model designs than the simple linear model, so correct specification is important. Students are introduced to model specification problems, implications and solutions.
- This empirical exercise reinforces the above outcomes by examining the econometric theory with data. Students will be able to estimate linear models in Excel, hypothesis tests of the estimates, and provide a brief interpretation of the estimates and implications on model design.
- Two of the linear model assumptions are relaxed leading to heteroskedasticity and endogeneity. Students will understand the implications of these violations on the estimates and hypothesis tests. They will also know how to test for a violation and be able to present solution(s) to fix the resulting implications.
- Students will learn about simple time series models and autoregressive models. Students will be able to derive the properties of the model and estimates. Forecasting is introduced, to learn how to assess the statistical difference between time series models.
- The last of the linear model assumptions is relaxed by way of autocorrelation. Students will derive the implications of, how to test for, and how to correct for this violation.
- This empirical exercise reinforces the above outcomes by examining the econometric theory with data. Students will be able to estimate linear models in Excel, hypothesis tests of the estimates, examine model specification and potential violations of the linear model assumptions. Students will be able to discuss the interpretation of the estimates, implications on model design, and potential solutions.



## **Policies Regarding Academic Accommodation**

Failure to follow this procedure may result in denial of academic accommodation and a grade of zero. Students should also set up an appointment as soon as possible to meet with their instructor. Notifying instructors of a missed exam does not automatically entitle students to a makeup.
