Prerequisite/Antirequisite Note:

The prerequisites for this course are Economics 1021 and Economics 1022, or Economics 2001. The antirequisites for this course are Economics 2163, Economics 2164, and Economics 3352. In addition, you should be very comfortable with basic algebra and geometry. This course will make heavy use of these tools.

You are responsible for ensuring that you have successfully completed all course prerequisites, and that you have not taken any anti-requisite courses. Lack of prerequisites may not be used as a basis for appeal. If you are found to be ineligible for a course, you may be removed from it at any time and you will receive no adjustment to your fees. This decision cannot be appealed.

If you find that you do not have the course prerequisites, it is in your best interest to drop the course well before the end of the add/drop period. Your prompt attention to this matter will not only help protect your academic record, but will ensure that spaces become available for students who require the course in question for graduation.

This course consists of two parts: 1) international trade and 2) international finance. In the first part we will study the main determinants of the global flows of goods and services, through international trade, of people through migration, and of capital through foreign direct

investment. In order to do so, a survey of the different models of trade and factor mobility will be discussed. We will analyze the main predictions of the models, as well as the different policies implemented by the countries. The second part of the course will be related to international finance. We will cover topics such as exchange rate determination and macroeconomic policy under different exchange rate regimes.

Course Learning Outcomes:

By the end of this course, students will learn to:

- Analyze the determinants of comparative advantage and international trade in common theories of international trade
- Asses the main predictions of the different international trade theories and compare them to data
- Evaluate the effects of tariffs, impediments to trade and policies through the lens of the different models covered in class
- Use models of foreign exchange determination to explain currency fluctuations
- Examine the evolution and implications of current exchange rate regimes

Textbook and Course Materials:

Feenstra Robert C. and Taylor, Alan M. (2014). *Essentials of International Economics* (third edition) New York, NY. Worth Publishers. Any edition is fine though.

Assessments and Grading:

The course will be based on four quizzes, a midterm, and an exam. Each quiz is worth 2.5% and is meant to be a way to practice the material for the midterm and exam. The midterm is worth 40% and the exam is cumulative and worth 50%. All assessments will be delivered in-person. The material for all assessments consists of the topics covered in the text, any assigned readings and the material covered in the lectures. Some of the topics covered in the lectures, including problems done in class, may not appear in the text. Students are reminded that they are responsible for this material.

Students with approved accommodations for missed assessments will have weight transferred to the final exam. Missed assessments without approved accommodations will be given a grade of zero with no make-up. Students with approved accommodations for missing the final exam will write the exam at a time set by the department after the semester ends. Any student that misses the make-up exam will receive an INC and can complete the exam the next time the course is offered.

 must not conflict with tests or final exams.
