Course Description:

This is an intermediate course on derivatives securities that emphasizes practical applications. Topics include valuation models of derivatives (futures, forwards, options and swaps), stochastic processes, trading strategies using derivatives, the Greeks and portfolio management, and if time permits, real options and project evaluation.

Course Objectives:

This course offers a deeper look at derivative securities. Its objective is to provide students with a solid basis to understand and use derivative securities in portfolio construction and management. Topics include hedging strategies, valuation of options, the Black-Scholes-Merton model and the Greek letters.

Course Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Evaluate risk-return trade-offs in financial markets
- 2. Understand optimal portfolio allocation strategies
- 3. Understand the use of financial derivatives in hedging portfolios
- 4. Be comfortable with using the Black-Scholes-Merton model
- 5. Have some practice with practical applications to portfolios

Assessments and Grading:

The final course mark will be calculated based on the following: Assignments: 40% Midterm: 25% Final Exam: 35%

There will be 5 assignments with the following due dates: Jan 21, Feb 4, Feb 25, March 11, April 1. The top 4 out of 5 assignments will be used in the calculation of the final grade. Due to the flexibility in this assessment, academic consideration through self-attestation will be denied. Assignments are due at the beginning of the lecture on the due date. Late assignments will receive a 10% penalty per day and will not be accepted more than one week late.

The two examinations (Midterm and Final Exam) will be closed book with the exception of students being permitted to bring a hand-written formula sheet. This is a double sided page, a page refers to a letter size page (215.9×279.4 millimeters or 8.50×11.00 inches), which may only contain formulas. Students are also permitted to use a non-programmable calculator. Students may not use any other resources or outside assistance during exams. Both examinations will be 3 hours in duration and consist of a combination of calculation and long-form written responses.

The midterm is tentatively scheduled for February 25 during the scheduled lecture time (subject to approval by Exam Central). The final exam will be scheduled by the Registrar's Office during the exam period.

The midterm is designated as not permitting the use of self-attestations by students.

- Futures and hedging strategies using futures
- Interest rates and swaps
- Options usage and pricing (Black-Scholes, Binomial)
- Portfolio risk measures
- Estimating correlations and volatility
- The Greek letters and applications to portfolio management
- Credit risk
- Counterparty risk

- **Rewriting Exams and Retroactive Reweighting are NOT Permitted:** Students who proceed to write a test or examination must be prepared to accept the mark.
